ANTONOMASIA, *an-to-no-mas'-se-ah*, sf. (Rhet.) Antonomasia, a figure by which a title is put for a proper name; as, The Orator, for Cicero.

ANTONOMASTICO, ca, *an-toe-no-mas'-te-co*, *cah*, a. Antonomastic.

ANTOR, *an-tore'*, sm. (Law. Prov.) Vender of stolen goods, bought bona fide.

ANTORCHA, *an-tor'-tchah*, sf. 1. Torch, flambeau, taper. 2. A cresset.

ANTORCHERO, *an-tor-tcher'-o*, sm. (Obs.) A candlestick for tapers, &c.

ANTORIA, *an-tor'-ee-ah*, sf. (Law. Prov.) The action of discovering the first seller of stolen goods.

ANTOTRAS, *an'-trass*, sm. Vermilion.

ANTRO, *an-tro*, sm. (Poet.) Antre, cavern, den, grotto.

ANTROPOFAGO, *an-tro-po-fah'-goe*, sm. A cannibal.—*s. pl.* Anthropophagi. In English it has no singular.

ANTROPOGRAFI'A, *an-tro-po-grah'-feh'-ah*, sf. Anthropography, descriptive anatomy of man.

ANTROPOLOGIA, *an-tro-po-logic'-ah*, sf. Anthropology, the science of the human structure.

ANTROPOMORITA, *an-tro-po-mor-fee'-tah*, sf. Anthropomor-

phite, one who assigns a human form to the Deity.

ANTROPOSOFIA, *an-tro-poso-foh'-ah*, sf. Anthroposophy, the knowledge of the nature of man.

ANTRUJEJA'R, *an-troo-eh'-har*, *er*. (Prov.) To wet with water, or play some trick.

ANTRUJEJO, *an-troo-eh'-hoe*, sm. The three days of the carnival.

ANTRUI'DO, *an-troo-ed-doe*, sm. (Obs.) V. ANTRUEJO.

ANTUVIO'N, *an-too-ve-on'*, sm. (Coll.) A sudden, unexpected stroke or attack. *De antuvion*, Unexpectedly. Fulano vino de antuvion,

Such-a-one came unexpectedly.

ANUAT'L, *ah-noo-ab'*, a. Annual.

Plantas anuales, (Bot.) Annual plants.

ANUALIDAD, *ah-noo-al-e-dad*, sf. 1. State or quality of being annual. 2. Pensions paid by the state.

ANUALMENTE, *ah-noo-al-me-tay*, ad. Annually.

ANUBADA'DA, *ah-noo-bah'-dah*, sf. An ancient tax paid in Spain.

ANUBARRA'DO, da, *ah-noo-bar-rah'-doh*, *dah*, a. Clouded.

ANUBLADAMENTE, *ah-noo-blah'-men-tay*, ad. Mistily.

ANUBLATO, da, *ah-noo-blah'-doh*, *dah*, a. 1. Overcast, clouded, dim, mistful. 2. (Speaking of colors,) Somewhat more obscure than the rest.—pp. of ANUBLAR.

ANUBLAR, *ah-noo-blah'*, va. 1. To cloud, to darken the light of the sun. 2. To overcast. 3. (Met.) To cloud or obscure merit.—*er*. 1. To be blasted, withered, or mildewed: applied to corn and plants. 2. (Met.) To miscarry, to be disconcerted; speaking of plans.
