G hay, Before the vowels, *a, o, u*, and *u*, has the same sound in Spanish as in English; but before *e* and *i*, is the same as the Spanish *j*, or the English *h* strongly aspirated, as in *hay, her, he*. Before the diphthong *ue*, as in *guerra, guion*, the *u* becomes liquid, and the *g* has the hard sound, as in the English words *gelding, give*; with a dieresis over the *u*, both letters have their proper sound, as in *agüero*.

GABA'CHA, *gah-bah'-chah, sf*. Kind of loose garment.

GABA'CHO, *gah-bah'-cho, sm*. Sloven, a dirty, miserable fellow.

GABA'N, *gah-ban, sm*. 1. Great-coat with a hood and close sleeves. 2. Sack.

GABARDA, *gah-bar-dah, sf*. (Prov.) Wild white rose.

GABARDINA, *gah-bar-dee-nah, sf*. Gabardine, cassock with close-buttoned sleeves.

GABARRA, *gah-bar-rah, sf*. (Nan.) Lighter, a large boat.

GABARRERO, *gah-bar-ree-er-o, sm*. 1. Dealer in wood and timber. 2. (Nan.) Lighterman.

GABARRO, *gah-bar-ro, sm*. 1. A morbid swelling on the pastera of horses. 2. Pip, a horny pellicle on the tongue of fowls. 3. Flaw or defect in cloth. 4. Error or mistake in accounts. 5. Defect discovered in goods after they have been bought. 6. (Met.) Obligation, burdensome charge; error in accounts.

GABATA, *gah-bah-tah, sf*. Bowl, a small wooden basin.

Name given in Mexico to a native of Spain, who in Lima is called *Chapeton*, and in Buenos Ayres *Maturrango*.
GAFÁ, *gah-fah*, *sf.* A kind of hook, used to bend a cross-bow.—*pl.* 1. (Nau.) Can-hooks, used to raise or lower casks. 2. (Coll.) Spectacles. 3. The mounting of spectacle-glasses.
GAFAR, *gah-far*, *va.* To hook, to catch with a hook.
GAFFEDAD, *gah-fay-dad*, *sf.* 1. Kind of leprosy. 2. Contraction of the nerves.
