



INTERINIDA'D, *sf.* Quality of holding a temporary charge or office.

INTERI'NO, *na*, *in-ter-e'-no*, *nah*, *a*. Provisional; appointed provisionally, having the temporary charge of an employ or office.

INTERIO'R, *in-ter-e'-or*, *a*. Interior, internal, inward, inner.

INTERIO'R, *sm*. 1. The interior, inside, inner part. 2. Mind. *Intertores*, Entrails, intestines.

INTERIORIDA'D, *in-ter-e-or-e-dad'*, *sf*. 1. Inside, interior part. 2. The act of concealing any thing, and the thing hidden.

INTERIORNE'TE, *in-ter-e-or-en'-tay*, *ad*. In the interior, internally, inwardly, interiorly.

INTERLOCUCIO'N, *in-ter-lo-cooth-e-on'*, *sf*. 1. Interlocution, dialogue; interchange of speech. 2. (Littl. us.) Intervention, mediation.

INTERLOCUTORIO, *ra*, *in-ter-lo-coo-tor'-e-o*, *ah*, *a*. Interlocutor, one who speaks in the name of another. 2. Collocutor, colloquist, one of the speakers in a dialogue.

INTERLOCUTORIAMENTE, *ad*. In an interlocutory manner.

INTERLOCUTORIO, *ria*, *in-ter-lo-coo-tor'-e-o*, *ah*, *a*. Interlocutory, preparatory to a definitive decision.

INTERMEDIO, *in-ter-may-de-o*, *sm*. 1. Interval, intermediate, time passing between; interim. 2. Interlude, an entertainment between the acts of a play; farce; interval; middle.

INTERMINA'BLE, *in-ter-me-na-bl'*, *blay*, *a*. Interminable, endless.

INTERMITIR, *in-ter-pray-tar'*, *va*. To intermit, to discontinue.

INTERNA'CION, *in-ter-nath-e-on'*, *sf*. Importation. Derechos de internacion, Importation duties.

INTERNALMENTE, *ad*. Internally. V. INTERIORMENTE.

INTERNA'R, *in-ter-nar'*, *va*. To pierce, to penetrate beyond the surface; to penetrate into the interior of a country.—*er*. To insinuate, to gain upon the affections by gentle degrees; to wheedle.

INTERNECIO'N, *sf*. (Littl. us.) Internecion, massacre, slaughter.
