 JABO'N, *hal-bone*, *sm.* 1. Soap. 2. (Met.) Any saponaceous mass or matter. *Jabon de palencia*, (Coll.) Battlet used by washer-women to wash linen. *Jabon de piedra* or *de Castilla*, 1. Castile soap. 2. (Coll.) Smart stroke with a batlet. *Dar un jabon*, To reprimand severely. *Bola de jabon*, Wash-ball.

 JACA'T, *hal'-kal*, *sm.* (Mex.) An Indian hut, a wigwam.  
 JA'CARA, *hah'-car-ah*, *sf.* 1. A sort of romance. 2. A kind of rustic tune for singing or dancing; a kind of dance. 3. Company of young men who walk about at night-time singing *jácaras*. 4. Malediction, vexation. 5. Idle talk or prattle, story, tale; fable, lie, vainglorious fiction.  
 JACARANDI'NA, JACARAN-DA'NA, *hah-car-an-dee-nah*, *hal-*  
*car-an-dah'-nah*, *sf.* 1. Low, foul language, slang; the language of ruffians and prostitutes' bullies. 2. Singing of *jácaras* or boastings. 3. (Low) Assembly of ruffians and thieves.

 JA'GUA, *hal'-goo-ah*, *sf.* Fruit of a tree in Cuba.  
 JAGUADE'RO, *sm.* (Obs.) V. DESAGUADERO.  
 JACARERO, *hal-car-er'-o*, *sm.* 1. Ballad-singer. 2. Wag or merry irl, a factious person. 3. Boaster. JACARILLA, *hal-car-il'-ye-*  
*ah*, *sf. dim.* of JA'CARA.  
 JACARO, *hal-car-o*, *sm.* Boaster, bally. *A' lo jácaro*, In a boastful or bragging manner.  
 JAHARRA'R, *hal-ar-rar'*, *va.* To plaster, to overlay or make even with plaster.  
 JAHA'RRO, *hal-ar-rro*, *sm.* Irrigation, inroad.  
 JACENA, *hath-ay'-nah*, *sf.* Plaster, the act of plastering.  
 JALA'PA, *hal-lah'-pah*, *sf.* (Bot.) 1. Jalapa. *Convolvulus jalapa*, *L.* 2. Jalap, the root of the jalap, plant frequently used in medicine.  
 JACERINO, *na*, *a.* (Obs.) Hard, steely.  
 JACHALI', *hal-tchah-lee'*, *sm.* Girder, a beam on which joists rest.  
 JACERINA', *hal-er-ee'-nah*, *sf.* Mail, a coat of steel net-work for defence.  
 JALBEGA'DO, *da*, *hal-bag-gah-*  
*do*, *dah*, *a.* and *pp.* of JALBEGAR.  
 JALBEGAR, *hal-bag-gar'*, *va.* White-washed, painted.  
 JALDANO, *la*, *hal-dah-lo*, *lah*, *a.* Having the gait and dialect of an Andalusian; particularly in giving the *h* a strong guttural sound.  
 JANGA'DA, *han-yah'-dah*, *sf.* Raft, frame or float. *Jangada de perchas para arbolandura*, (Nau.) Raft of spars for masting.  
 JANGUA', *han-goo'-ah*, *sf.* A small armed vessel, like a raft.  
 JANNEQUIN', *han-nay-keen'*, *sm.* A sort of cotton which comes from the Levant.  
 JANSENISM, *han-say-nees-*  
*sm.* Jansenism, the doctrine and opinions of Jansen.  
 JANEISTA, *han-say-nees-*  
*ta*, *sm.* Jansenist, a follower of Jansen.  
 JANTHO, *han-teel'-o*, *sm.* (Bot.) Lesser burdock. Xanthium strumarium, *L.*  
 JANTOLINA', *han-toe-lee'-nah*, *sf.* Calf's foot jelly.  
 JALJACOT'E, *hal-hah-coe'-tay*, *sm.* (Bot.) Guava, a South American pear-tree, the leaves of which are used for curing the itch and cutaneous diseases. *Psidium ptyrifolium*, *L.*  
 JALLU'LO, *hal-lye-oo'-lo*, *sm.* (Prov.) Bread toasted in the ashes.  
 JA'LMA, *hal'-mah*, *sf.* A kind of pack-saddle.  
 JALMERO, *hal-mer'-o*, *sm.* One whose trade is to make pack-saddles and harness for mules.  
 JA'DEAR, *hal-day-ah'*, *vn.* To pant, to palpitate, to have the breast heaving as for want of breath; to jade.  
 JA'DE'O, *hal-day-o*, *sm.* Pant, palpitation.  
 JA'DIA'R, *hal-de-ah'*, *va.* (Prov.) To dig up with a spade.  
 JA'ECERO, *ra*, *hah'-er-o*, *ah*, *s.* Harness-maker.  
 JA'EN, *hal-en'*, *sm.* A kind of large grape, with thick rind.  
 JA'EZ, *hal'-eth*, *sm.* 1. Harness, the traces of draught-horses. 2. Manner or quality in which several things resemble each other. *Jae-*  
*ces*, Ornaments or harness of horses in processions.  
 JA'MAVAS, *hal-mah-vas'*, *sf.* A kind of flowered silk.  
 JA'MBA, *hal'-bah*, *sf.* (Arch.) Door-jamb, window-post, which supports the lintel or head-piece.  
 JA'QUETA, *hal-kay-tah*, *sf.* Jacket, a short, loose coat.
