R, *er-ray*, *er-ay*, *sf.* This letter, at the beginning of a word, after *l*, *n*, *s*, and in compound words, the primitive of which begins with *r*, has a hard and rough sound; as, *rata*, *malrotar*, *enriquecer*, *carirendon*. When *ab* and *ob* are not prepositions, as in *abrogar*, *obrepicio*, the *r* becomes liquid; as in *abrojo*, *obrero*.—R in the middle of a word, or between two vowels, has a very smooth sound; as in *morosidad*, *peregrinar*. The harsh and rough sound of *r* between two vowels, in the middle of simple words, is always expressed by double *rr*; thus, *barraca*, *correcto*. *R* is used as a contraction of *reprobar*, like *A* for *aprobar*, in voting for degrees in universities; it also is used as a contraction for *real*, royal, and for *reverendo*, reverend, and on wool-packs it means *refina*. In the beginning of a medical prescription, *R* is an abbreviation of *recipe*, take.
