REHARTO, *ra*, *ray-ar-toe*, *tah*, *pp.* irr. of REHARTAR. Supersaturated.

REHARTAR, *ray-ar-tar*, *va.* To satiate again.

REHECHO, *cha*, *ray-ay-tee-ho*, *tchah*, *a.* and *pp.* irr. of REHACER. 1. Renewed, renovated; done over again. 2. Squat, broad-shouldered.

REHEN, *ray-en*, *sm.* Hostage: generally used in the plural.

REHENCHIDURA, *ray-en-tche-door-ah*, *sf.* Act of stuffing or re-filling.

REHENCHIR, *ray-en-tchir*, *va.* To fill again, to stuff anew.

REHENDIJA, REHENDRIJA, *ray-en-dee-hah*, *sf.* Crevice, cleft.

REHERIMIENTO, *ray-er-e-me-en-toe*, *sm.* Repulsion; inspection of weights.

REHERIR, *ray-er-ir*, *va.* 1. To repel. 2. To inspect and mark anew measures and weights.

REHERRA, *ray-er-rar*, *va.* To reshoe a horse.

REHERVIR, *ray-er-vir*, *vn.* 1. To boil again. 2. To be inflamed with love, to be blinded by passion.—*vn.* To ferment, to grow sour.

REHEZ, *a.* (Obs.) V. RAHEZ.

REHIZO, *ray-ee-ho*, *sm.* Shoot, sprout.

REHILADILLO, *sm.* Ribbon.

REHILANDERA, *ray-e-lan-der-ah*, *sf.* Wind-mill made of paper.

V. REGILERA.

REHILAR, *ray-e-lar*, *va.* To twist or contract too much.—*vn.* To stagger, to reel.

REHILETE, REHILERO, *ray-e-lay-tay*, *sm.* 1. A kind of shuttlecock played with battledoors. 2. A small arrow bearded with paper or feathers.

REHILLO, *ray-ee-lo*, *sm.* Shaking, shivering.

REHINCHIMIENTO, *ray-in-tche-me-en-toe*, *sm.* The act of filling or stuffing again.

REHIRMAR, *va.* (Obs.) V. REFIRMAR.

REHOGAR, *ray-o-gar*, *va.* To dress meat with a slow fire, basting it with butter or oil.

REHOLLAR, *ray-ol-lar*, *va.* To trample under foot, to tread upon.

REHOYA, *sf.* V. REHOYO.

REHOYAR, *ray-o-jar*, *va.* To dig holes again for planting trees.

REHOYO, *ray-o-jo*, *sm.* A deep hole or pit.

REHUIDA, *ray-oo-ee-dah*, *sf.* A second flight, running away again; rapid turn of hunted game.

REHUIR, *ray-oo-ir*, *vn.* 1. To withdraw, to retire. 2. To return to the place whence it was roused: applied to game. 3. To reject, to condemn.—*va.* To deny or refuse.

REHUNDIR, *ray-on-dir*, *va.* 1. To sink. 2. To melt metals. 3. To waste, to dissipate, to lavish.—*vn.* To increase perceptibly.

REHURTADO, *da*, *ray-oor-tah-doe*, *ah*, *a.* 1. Making windings to make the dogs lose the scent: applied to game. 2. Artfully evasive, delusive, furtive.—*pp.* of REHURTARSE.

REHURTARSE, *ray-oor-tar-say*, *vn.* To take a different route whence it rose: applied to game.

REHURTO, *ray-oor-toe*, *sm.* A movement of the body to avoid impending danger; a shrug.

REHUSAR, *ray-oo-sar*, *va.* To refuse, to decline, to deny what is solicited or required, to abnegate.

REIBLE, *a.* (Obs.) Laughable.

REIDERO, *ray-e-dee-o*, *sm.* Immoderate laughter.—*a.* Ready to laugh. *El tiene buenas reideras*, (Coll.) He laughs at every thing.

REIDOR, *ra*, *ray-e-dor-e*, *ah*, *s.* Laughter.

REIMPRESION, *ray-im-pray-se-on*, *sf.* 1. Reimpression of a book, &c., reprint. 2. Number of copies reprinted at once.

REIMPRIMIR, *ray-im-pre-mir*, *va.* To reprint, to print a new edition.

REINA, *ray-ee-nah*, *sf.* 1. Queen. 2. (Coll.) Any woman admired and loved. 3. Queen-bee. 4. Queen at chess. *Reina mora*, V. INFERNACULO.

REINA DO, *ray-ee-nah-doe*, *sm.* Reign, time of a sovereign's rule.

REINANTE, *ray-ee-nan-tay*, *pa.* Reigning, excelling; prevailing.

REINAR, *ray-ee-nar*, *va.* 1. To reign, to govern, to command. 2. To reign, to prevail, to predominate. 3. To reign, to obtain power or dominion.

REINCIDENCIA, *ray-in-thieh-den-thieh-ah*, *sf.* Reiteration, falling in again, relapse into vice or error.

REINCIDENTE, *ray-in-thieh-den-tay*, *pa.* Reiterating, relapsing.

REINCIDIR, *ray-in-thieh-dir*, *vn.* To relapse back into vice or error; to reiterate.

REINCORPORACION, *ray-in-cor-por-ath-e-on*, *sf.* Re-incorporation, renewing.

REINCORPORAR, *ray-in-cor-por-ar*, *va.* To incorporate a second time.—*vn.* To re embody.
