REITERADAMENTE, ad. Repeatedly.

REITERAR, ray-e-ter-ar', va. To reiterate, to repeat, to iterate.

REIVINDICACION, ray-e-vin-de-cath-e-on', sf. (For.) Recovery.

REIVINDICAR, ray-e-vin-de-car', va. To recover.

REJA, ray-hah, sf. 1. Ploughshare; colter or coulter. 2. Aration. 3. Iron grate of a window.

REJACAR, va. V. ARREJACAR.

REJADA, sf. V. ARREJADA.

REJADO, ray-hah-doe, sm. Grate of a door or window.

REJALCAR, ray-hal-car', va. To plough.

REJALGAR, ray-hal-gar', sm. Bealgar, red sulphuret of arsenic.

REJAZO, ray-hath-o, sm. Stroke or blow with a ploughshare.

REJERIA, ray-her-eel-ah, sf. Manufactory of the iron-work of grates, doors, or windows.

REJERO, ray-her-o, sm. Maker of bars, lattices, and grates.

REJILLA, ray-heel-lyah, sf. 1. A small lattice in confessionals, to hear women's confessions. 2. *Dim.* of REJA.

REJO, ray-ho, sm. 1. A pointed iron bar or spike. 2. Sting of a bee or other insect. 3. Nail or round iron with which quoits are played. 4. Rim of iron put around the frame of a door to strengthen it. 5. Strength, vigor.

REJOIN, ray-hone', sm. 1. Dagger, poniard. 2. A kind of lance or spear used by bull-fighters. 3. A short broad knife with a sharp point.

REJONAZO, ray-hon-ath-o, sm. Thrust with a dagger.

RELAMIDO, da, ray-lah-mee-doe, dah, a. Affected, too fine or nice in dress.—*pp.* of RELAMER.

RELAMPAGO, ray-lam-pah-go, sm. 1. Flash of lightning, meteor. 2. Any thing passing as suddenly as a flash of lightning. 3. Thought or idea flashing upon the mind; ingenious witicism. 4. Blemish in the eyes of horses. 5. (*Obs.*) Opening or closing rapidly the mantle worn by women.

RELATIVAMENTE, ad. Relatively, comparatively.

RELATIVO, va, ray-lah-teel-co, vah, a. 1. Relative, comparative. 2. (*Gram.*) Relative, relating to an antecedent.

RELATO, ray-lah-toe, sm. Statement, narration.

RELATOR, ray-lah-tore, sm. 1. Relater, teller, narrator. 2. Reporter, a counsellor at law appointed by the supreme courts to make the briefs of the causes that are to be tried: he reads them before the court, they having first been examined and approved by both the parties concerned.

RELATORIA, ray-lah-tor-ah, sf. The wife of the reporter of a court of justice.

RELATORIA, ray-lah-tor-sel-ah, sf. Office of a reporter of judicial causes in a court of justice.

RELAVAJE, ray-lah-vah-hay, sm. Washing-place for stuffs or clothes.

RELAVAR, ray-lah-var', va. To wash again.

RELAVE, ray-lah-vay, sm. Second washing of metals. *Relaves*, Washings or sweepings in a silversmith's or gold-worker's shop.

RELAVILLO, ray-lah-veel-lyo, sm. *dim.* Slight rewashing.

RELINCHAR, ray-lin-tchar', en. 1. To neigh, as a horse. 2. (*Iron.*) To shout, to cry in triumph or exultation.

RELINCHO, RELINCHIDO, ray-leen-tcho, sm. Neigh, neighing of a horse. *Relinchos*, (*Iron.*) Shouts, cries of triumph or exultation.

RELINDO, da, ray-leen-doe, Jah, a. Very neat and fine.

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RELINGA, ray-leent-gah, sf. (*Nau.*) Bolt-rope. *Relinga del grutil*, Head bolt-rope. *Relinga del pujamen*, Foot bolt-rope. *Relinga de las caidas*, Leech bolt-rope.

RELINGAR, ray-lin-gar', va. (*Nau.*) To sew bolt-ropes to sails.—*vn.* To rustle: said of bolt-ropes and sails moved by the wind.

Clock, watch. *Reloj de agua*, Clepsydra. *Reloj de arena*, Sand-glass, hour-glass. *Reloj de fultriguera*, Watch. *Reloj de sol* or *reloj solar*, Sun-dial. *Reloj de repeticion*, A repeater or repeating-watch. *Reloj lunar*, Lunar dial. *Estar como un reloj*, (*Coll.*) To be regular and well disposed.

RELOJERA, ray-lo-her'-ah, sf. 1. Clock-case. 2. Watchmaker's wife.

RELOJERIA, ray-lo-her-eel-ah, sf. 1. The art of making clocks and watches. 2. Watchmaker's shop.

RELOJERO, ray-lo-her-o, sm. Watchmaker, clockmaker.

RELUCHAR, ray-loo-tchar', en. To struggle, to wrestle, to strive, to labor, to debate.

RELUCIENTE, ray-looth-e-en-tay, a. Relucent, lucent, light, clear, clinquant.

RELUCIR, ray-looth-ir', en. To shine, to glow, to glisten, to glitter; to excel, to be brilliant. *Relucir la espalda*, To have a large portion: applied to women.

RELUMBRA NTE, ray-loom-bran-tay, pa. Resplendent.

RELUMBRE, ray-loom-bray, sm. Coppery or irony taste: applied to meat dressed in copper or iron vessels.

REMANGO, ray-man-go, sm. Plaits of the petticoat at the waist.

REMANSATSE, ray-man-sars-say, or. To obstruct the course of a fluid.

REMANSO, ray-man-so, sm. 1. Smooth, stagnant water. 2. Tardiness, lentiude.

REMANTE, ray-man-tay, sm. Rower.

REMAR, ray-mar', en. 1. To row, to paddle. 2. To toil, to struggle.

REMARCAR, ray-mar-car', va. To mark again.

REMATA'DA, ray-mah-tah-dah, sf. (*Low*) A decayed strumpet.

REMATADAMENTE, ad. Entirely, totally.

REMATADO, da, ray-mah-tah-doe, dah, a. 1. Ended, terminated. 2. Totally lost, utterly ruined. *Es loco rematado*, He is stark mad. *Rematado á galeras* or *presidio*, Condemned to the galleys or banishment.—*pp.* of REMATAR.

REMATAMIENTO, ray-mah-tah-me-en-toe, sm. V. REMATE.

REMATAR, ray-mah-tar', va. 1. To close, to terminate, to finish, to abut, to end at. 2. To adjudge to the best bidder. 3. To kill game at one shot. 4. To establish or marry a young woman.

Amendment, correction. 3. Remedy, cure. 4. Remedy, curative medicine. 5. Resource, refuge. 6. Action at law. *No tener un remedio*, To be destitute of aid or assistance.

REMENDAR, *ray-men-dar*, *va.* 1. To patch, to mend; to correct. 2. To adjust one thing to another.

REMENTON, *ray-men-done*, *sm.* Botcher, patcher; one who mends old clothes; a cobbler, a fripper.

REMENTIR, *ray-men-tir*, *vn.* To lie frequently.

REMETRO, *ray-met-ro*, *sm.* Row-er, paddler. V. RIMERO.

REMESA, *sf.* Sending of goods; remittance of money.

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REMESA/R, *ray-mes-sar*, *va.* To pluck out the hair.

REMESON, *ray-mes-sone*, *sm.* 1. Plucking out of hair; hair plucked out. 2. Stopping a horse in full gallop. 3. A skillful thrust in fencing.

REMETER, *ray-may-ter*, *va.* To put back, to put in; to put a clean cloth on children.

REMIER, *ray-me-er*, *sm.* The second extract of soft sugar taken from the cane.

REMIENDO, *ray-me-en-doe*, *sm.* 1. Patch, clout. 2. Amendment, addition. 3. Reparation, repair. 4. Brindle, the state of being spotted or tabby. 5. (Coll.) Badge of military orders worn by the knights. 6. (Print.) Short work of which few copies are printed. *A' remiendos*, By patchwork, by piecemeal.

REMINISCENCIA, *ray-me-nis-then-thich-ah*, *sf.* Reminiscence, recollection, memory.

REMIRADO, *da*, *ray-me-rah-doe*, *ah*, *a.* Prudent, cautious. — *pp.* of REMIRAR.

REMIRAR, *ray-me-rar*, *va.* To revise; to review. — *vr.* 1. To do or finish a thing with great care. 2. To inspect or consider with pleasure. 3. To reflect on or examine one's self.

REMISAMENTE, *ad.* Remissly, carelessly.

REMISIBLE, *ray-mis-see-blay*, *a.* Remissible.

REMISION, *ray-me-se-on*, *sf.* 1. The act of sending. 2. Remission, sending back, remitting, remitting. 3. Remission, forgiveness, grace. 4. Remission, indulgence. 5. Remission, abatement, cessation of intenseness. 6. The act of referring to another book or work.

REMISIVAMENTE, *ad.* With remission.

REMISIVO, *va*, *ray-me-see-vo*, *ah*, *a.* Remitting, serving to remit.

REMISO, *sa*, *ray-mee-so*, *ah*, *a.* 1. Remiss, careless, indolent. 2. Remiss, not rigorous.
