RETORTEO, *ray-tor-ter-o*, *sm.* Twirl, rotation. *Andar al retorteo*, To hover about.

RETORTIJAR, *ray-tor-te-har'*, *va.* To twist, to form into a ring. *V. ENSORTIJAR.*

RETORTIJON, *ray-tor-te-hon'*, *sm.* The act of twisting, contortion. *Retortijon de tripas*, Gripping.

RETOSTADO, *da*, *ray-tos-tah'-doe*, *dah*, *a.* and *pp.* of RETOSTAR. Brown-colored.

RETOSTAR, *ray-tos-tar'*, *va.* To toast again, to toast brown.

RETOZADOR, *ra*, *ray-toth-ah-dor'*, *ah*, *s.* Friskier, one not constant, a wanton.

RETOZADURA, *ray-toth-ah-door-ah*, *sf.* *V.* RETOZO.

RETOZAR, *ray-toth-ar'*, *vn.* 1. To frisk and skip about, to romp, to frolic, to dally, to sport, to play the fool. 2. To hoiden, to romp indecently. 3. To tickle, to invite to laughter and merriment; to titillate amorously. *Retozar con el verde*, To revel, to feast merrily. *Retozar la risa*, To be moved to laughter.

RETOZO, *ray-toth-o*, *sm.* Friskiness, romping, wantonness, lascivious gayety, frisk, a frolic, dalliance. *Retozo de la risa*, Suppressed laughter.

RETOZON, *na*, *ray-toth-on'*, *ah*, *a.* Wanton, rompish, frolicsome, playful, gamesome, coltish.

RETOZONA, *ray-toth-o-nah*, *sf.* Romp, a rude, noisy girl.

RETRABAR, *ray-trah-bar'*, *va.* To revive a quarrel.

RETRACCION, *ray-trac-thieh-on'*, *sf.* Retraction, drawing back.

RETRACTACION, *ray-trac-tath-e-on'*, *sf.* Retraction, recantation.

RETRACTAR, *ray-trac-tar'*, *va.* To retract.—*vr.* To go back from one's word.

RETRACTO, *ray-trac-toe*, *sm.* (Law) Retraction, the act or right of retrieving or recovering a thing sold to another.

RETRAER, *ray-trah-er'*, *ra.* 1. To retract, to draw back. 2. To reclaim, to dissuade. 3. To reproach, to upbraid. 4. To mock, to ridicule. 5. To retrieve, to recover a thing sold. 6. To assimilate; to refer.—*vr.* To take refuge; to flee.

RETRAIDO, *ray-trah-ed-toe*, *sm.* Fugitive, one who has taken sanctuary in a sacred place.—*Retraido da*, *da*, *pp.* of RETRAER.
