U, *oo*, Is the twenty-third letter in the Castilian alphabet; it loses its sound after *g* and *g*, and becomes liquid, except where it is followed by an *a*, as in *guarismo*, or when marked with a diaeresis, as in *águero*, when it retains its proper sound. The letters *b*, *v*, and *w* were formerly used as equivalent to each other in writing or printing. Example: *Las cosas de Perpiñán estan en mucha quiebra*, por auer quitado yn gobernador, que tratan bien la ciudad. (*Comentarios de Herrera*, Madrid, 1624.) This observation will prevent many mistakes in reading. Each of these letters is at present restricted to its own proper sound, and particular care should be taken not to confound them, as they differ both in sound and in import; as, *él desuela*, he unpaves; *d desuela*, he keeps others awake.

U, *oo*, A conjunction disjunctive, used in the place of *o*, to avoid cacophony (before *o* or *ho*); as, *plata ú oro*, Silver or gold; *vitima ú hocusto*, A victim or a holocaust.

U, *oo*, *interj.* Ah! alas!

UBERRIMÓ, *ma*, *oo-beer'-re-mo*, *mah*, *a.* Very fruitful; extremely abundant.
