

On appelle vers *libres* ceux qui n'ont aucune uniformité ni pour le nombre des syllabes, ni pour le mélange des rimes.

DE L'ÉLISION.

Quand dans un vers la dernière syllabe d'un mot est terminée par un *e* muet *seul*, et que le mot qui suit commence par une voyelle ou par un *h* non aspiré, cette syllabe s'élide, c'est-à-dire, se confond dans la prononciation avec la première syllabe du mot suivant, et ne compte que pour une seule; mais si le mot est terminé par un *e* muet suivi d'un autre mot qui commence par une consonne ou par un *h* aspiré, l'*e* muet ne s'élide pas, et conséquemment compte pour un syllabe.

Telles sont les règles fondamentales de la versification française, que nous avons cru devoir rappeler à la mémoire de nos jeunes lecteurs.
